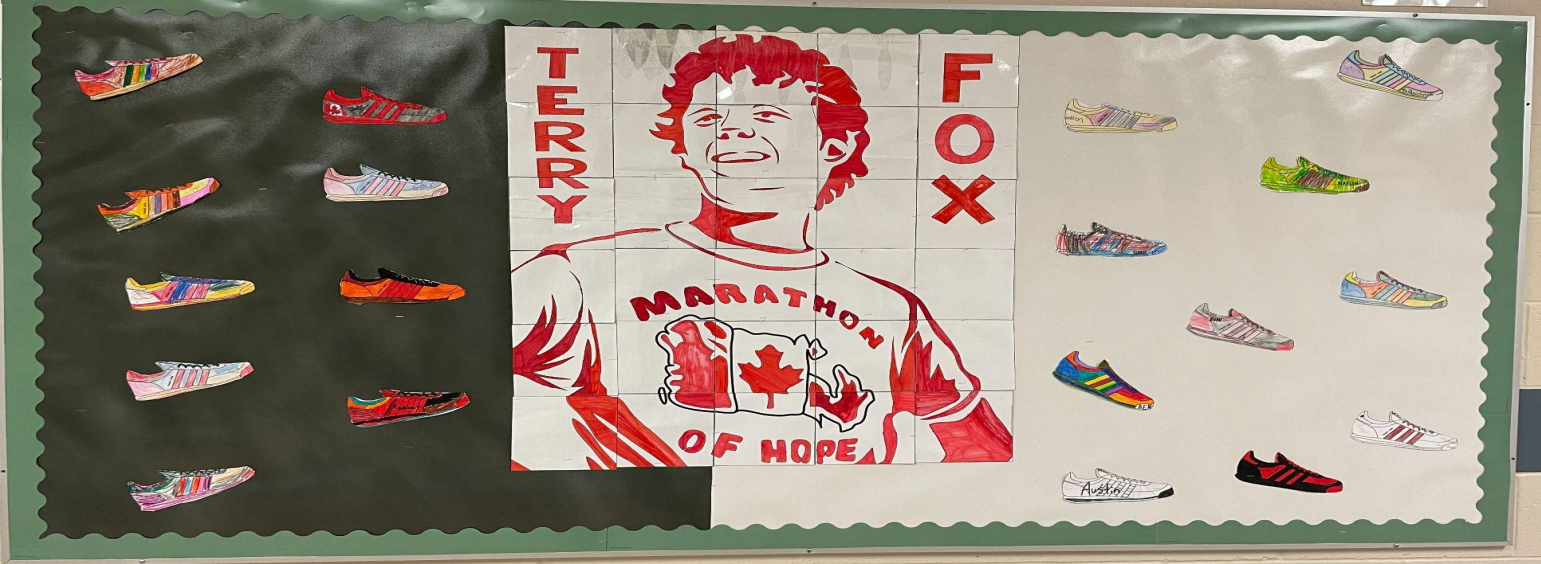

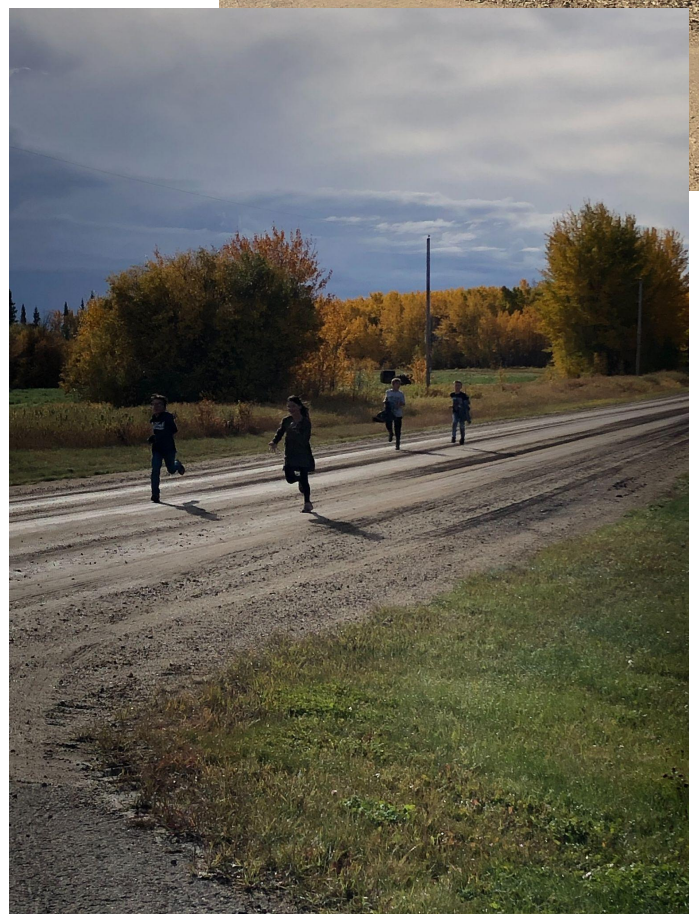
PRSD thanks its professional school bus drivers, staff, students, families, community organizations and community members for their commitment to ensure student safety.

Each day PRSD transports approximately 2495 students to 24 schools with a total service area of 11,860 kilometers.

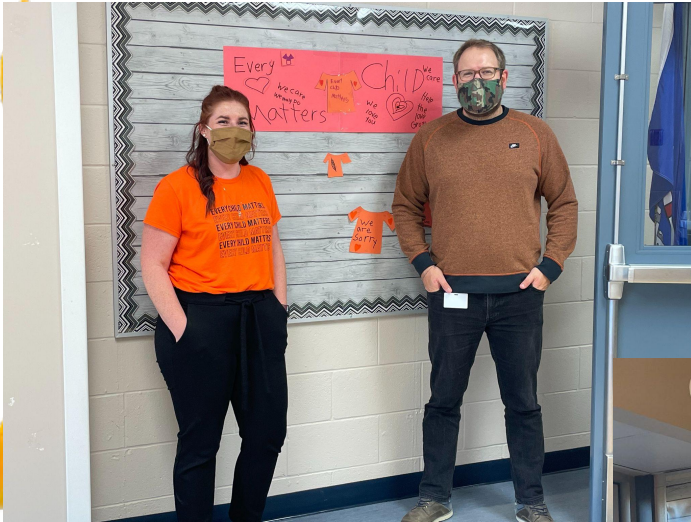


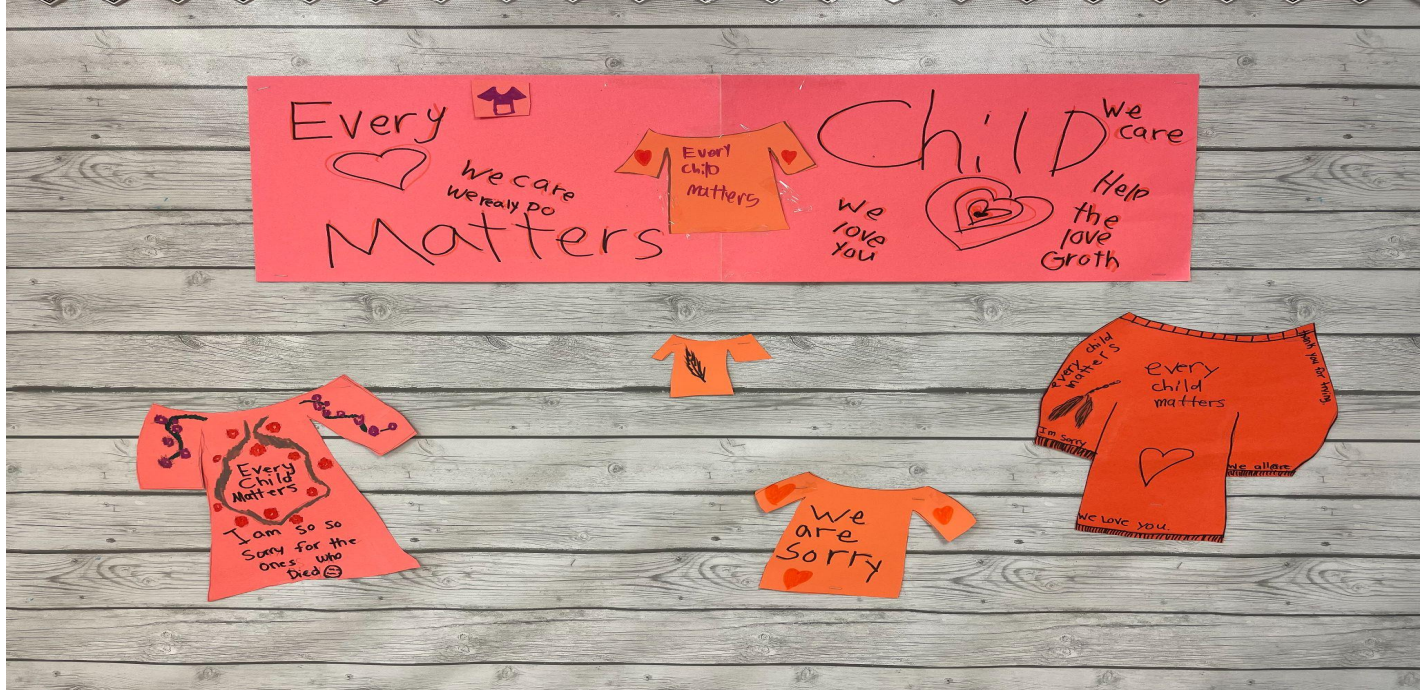

Social

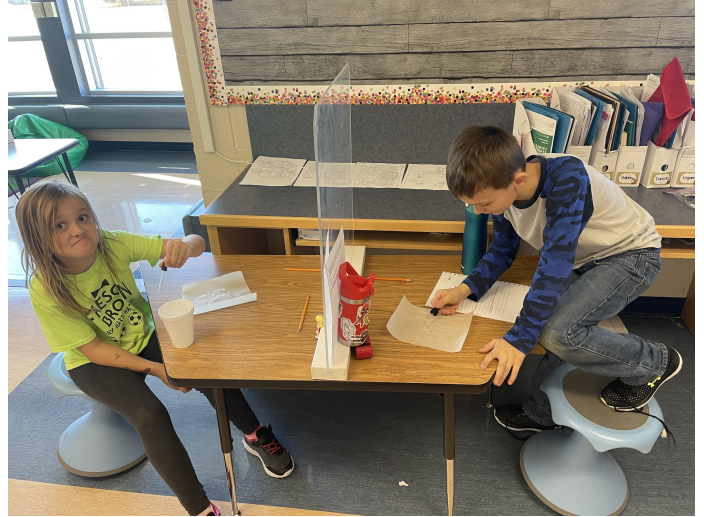
We will continue to study the theme "I am Unique". We will create self-portraits showing their hair colour and style. We will also discuss what makes us unique.



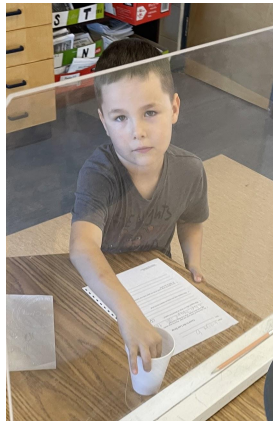
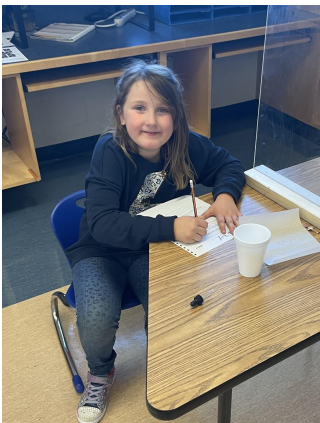
October in 1/2/3



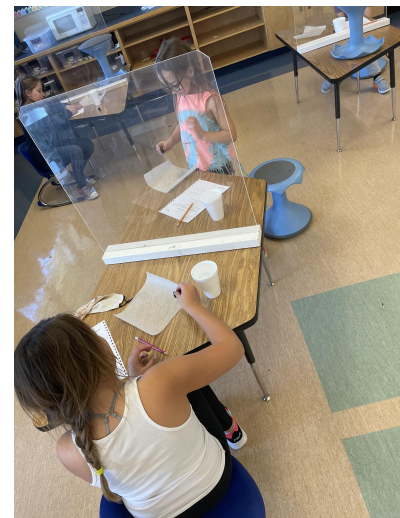
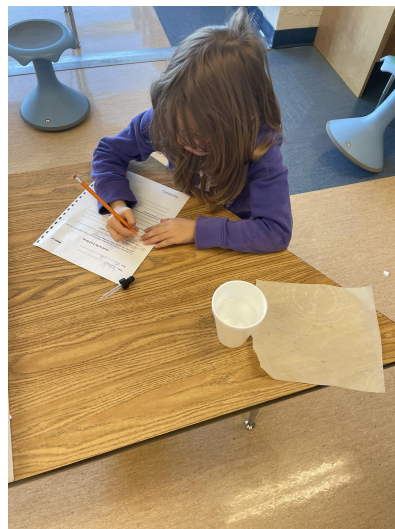

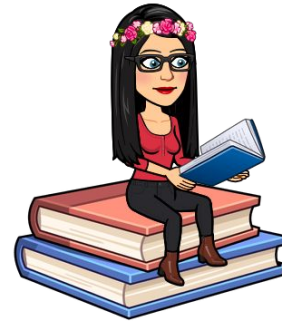
In Social Studies Grade 1 students continue to learn about our community while the Grade 2 and 3 students are learning about the past in a variety of communities across Canada.



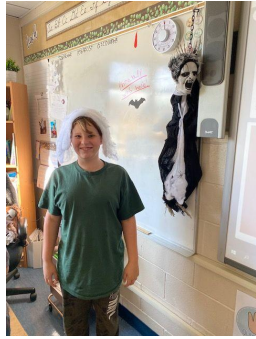
Thank you Dan and Louise Brister of Northern Lights fruit and Vegetable company!

Grade 6s are learning about Democracy, and how citizens participate in decision making.



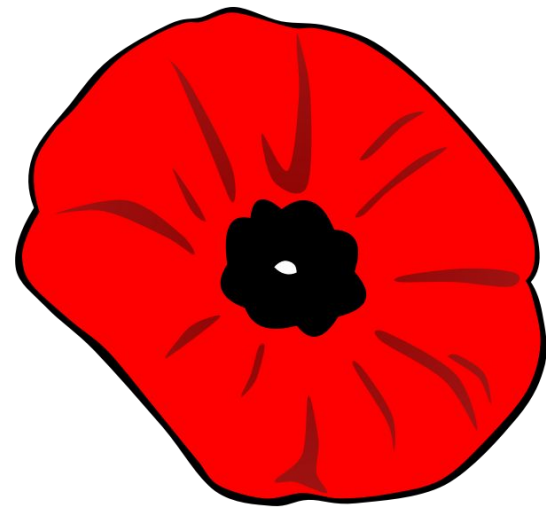

In Language Arts we have been very busy reading narratives and figuring out if they are factual or opinion. Students have been identifying the main idea and focusing on how the author organizes their ideas, and supports them with details. Next week, students will be writing an article of their own.

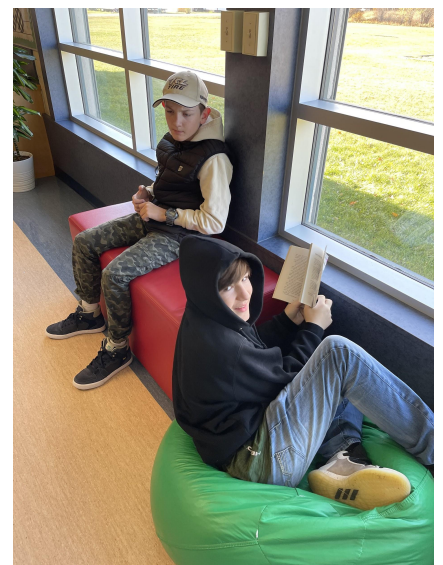
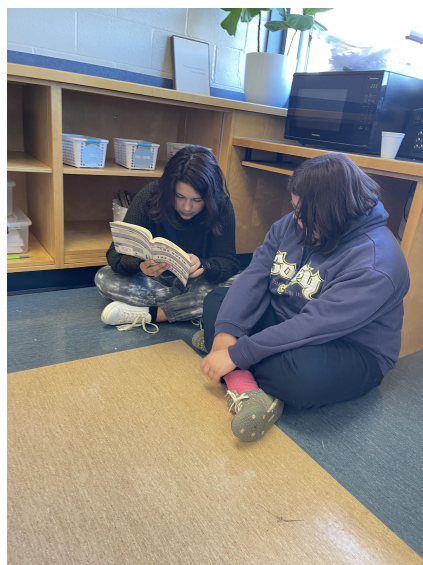
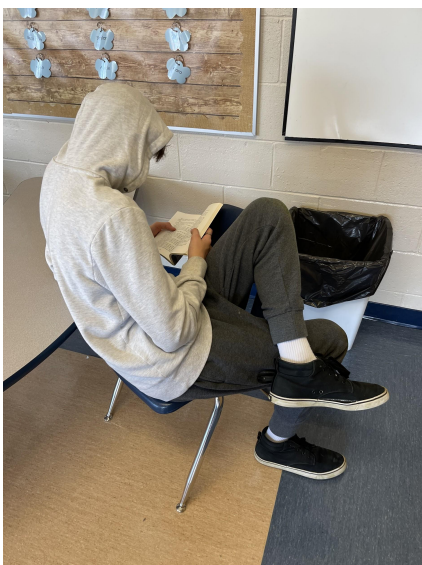
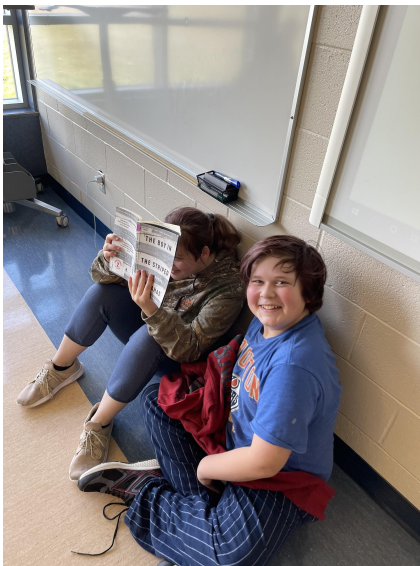


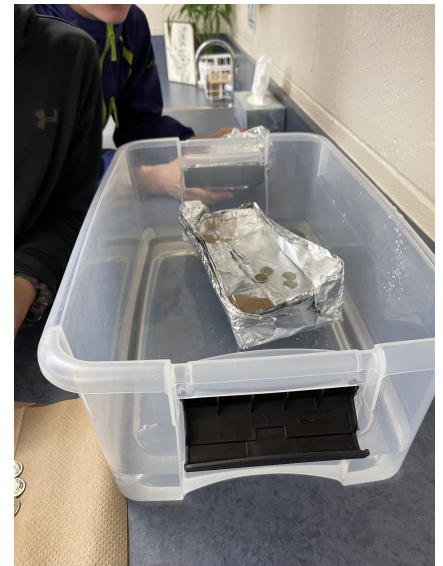
Happy Fall!
The 7/8/9s continued to show how hard work working they are for the month of October!



In Language Arts, the 7/8/9s have completed their novel *The Boy in the Striped Pajamas*. It was so awesome to see all the students get into the book and share their thoughts! We are working on a final project for the novel, and I am so excited to see what they will come up with!

We continue to do daily work with reading and writing, and the students have settled in well to their routine. We will begin a descriptive writing unit, as well as introduction to genre for reading for the rest of October and into November!





The students have been working so hard with their science units that we are nearing the end!

The 7/8s had a chance to make penny boats (well, dime boats now!) for their buoyancy and density lessons. They were able to put their knowledge of density and their math skills to test and predict if their boats would sink or float with a given amount of dimes. So cool!

The 9s have been learning all about the periodic table and how to name different chemical compounds!

We will be done both units by the end of October and moving onto the next! The 7/8s will be starting Cells and Systems, and the 9s will be starting Environmental Chemistry!

ART

Again this year, each art class will be looking at different works of art once a month and starting a discussion around it. They are encouraged to talk about things like what elements they see in each piece, how it makes them think or feel, and what story they believe the artist is telling.

As we move into November, all students have started work on a Remembrance Day poster. There will be permission forms coming home that parents can sign and return if they wish their child's poster to be submitted to the Royal Canadian Legion for their annual poster contest.

This month, Grades 1-3 examined Van Gogh's *Starry Night*, and created their own version, using a fork to create movement. They also painted *Splat the Cat*, first breaking down their drawing into basic shapes

The Grade 4-6 class finished their metal tooling texture projects, and the results are fantastic!

Grades 7-9 completed their Bren Bataclan paintings, and studied composition in art with collages.

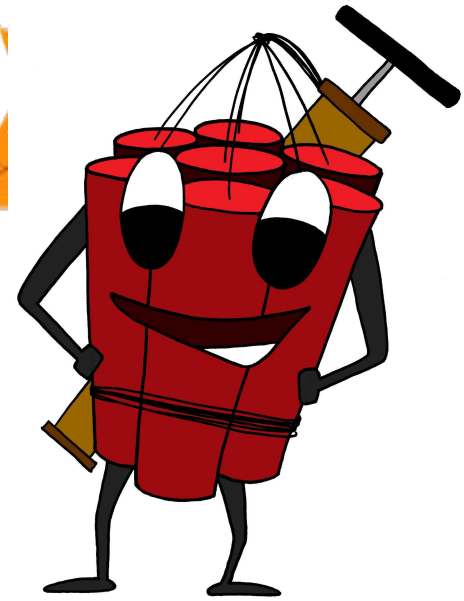
DIXONVILLE SCHOOL DYNAMITE SHOUT OUTS!


