Superintendent message

Have you ever heard these terms from your child(ren)'s school - RCAT, WAT, MIPI NCAT, and F & P BAS? These are all acronyms for local assessments that are used in all of Peace River School Division's (PRSD) schools to support students' learning needs and achievement. Teachers use these powerful tools to determine how students learn and to develop personalized instructional activities. Strategic use of local assessments also helps to improve student performance on Provincial Achievement Tests (PATs) and Diploma Exams.

RCAT = Reading Comprehension Assessment Tool

WAT = Writing Assessment Tool

MIPI = Math Intervention/Programming Instrument

NCAT = Numeracy Common Assessment Tool

F & P BAS = Fountas & Pinnell Benchmark Assessment System 1 and 2

To help enhance your understanding about why local assessments are powerful tools in supporting your child(ren)'s learning, I would like to share some details about why we use them and what benefits our students receive from their use.

The local assessments listed above help teachers to determine their students' level of knowledge and skills in the core areas of Literacy and Numeracy. These assessments will tell a teacher if there are any learning gaps with key concepts in Literacy and Numeracy. This information can be used to provide targeted lessons and useful accommodations to help the student learn important skills in Literacy and Numeracy. The assessments are done at the beginning of the year and then again later in the year to assess progress. The frequency that these assessments are administered allows Teachers and Educational Assistants to give targeted interventions and accommodations immediately after the assessment is completed.

All schools within PRSD have school teams made up of Teachers, Educational Assistants, I-Coaches, and Principals. These teams make up our School Division's Collaborative Response to meeting your child(ren)'s needs. These school teams receive support from Divisional I-Coaches, Program Coordinators, Assistant Superintendents of Teaching and Learning and Learning Supports, and even me!

Local assessments are powerful tools in contributing to our mission to ensure every child is literate and numerate, not most students, but every student!

To further explore the power of local assessments, I encourage you to go to our website and read PRSD's Three-Year Education Plan for 2021-2024. We look forward to continuing to collaborate with all parents in achieving our collective goal of success for all students.

Remembrance Day 11/11/21

Our school hosted a Remembrance Day ceremony this year on November 10th. We had special guests join us from the Grimshaw Royal Legion as well as Mrs. Gladys Bruce who is a local veteran.

Kindergarten News

Literacy

We are becoming quite the letter detectives! Your child can spot the letters, M, O, T, R, A, H, P, B S, D, X and U. They are also learning which letters are vowels and which ones are consonants. We continue to look for words that begin with any of these letters. You can also help at home by looking for all those letters and practicing their sounds. We participate in whole group reading daily. This is called Shared Reading. This is where we practice concepts about print skills. For example, learning that reading is left to right, pointing to individual words and turning pages in the book from front to back. In December, we will read and write about Christmas. These stories will be both fiction and non-fiction. Many students already know the difference!





Numeracy

We are continuing to work on comparing and ordering numbers from 0-5 and learning to read, write and count through 10. We will build and compare sets of objects and describe relationships among them using terms more, less, and equal.

November in 1/2/3

We have been hard at work in the 1/2/3 room. The students continue to work on reading in small groups and practicing at home. In writing we are learning all about and how to use the element of suspense. In math we have started working on addition to 20 (Grade 1), 100 (Grade 2) and 1000 (Grade 3).



We would like to welcome Mrs. Fedorowicz into our classroom. She is a student teach joining us for the month of November and into December. As well she will be back in February through April. She will be helping and taking on teaching responsibilities in the classroom. Mrs. Bullen will also be in the room so it will be great having both working with students.

In Science we will all continue working on the Exploring Liquids unit. Students have been having so much fun playing and experimenting with a variety of liquids. In Social Studies we are learning about Rural and Urban Communities and the similarities and differences in these communities.

We are so excited to plan lots of fun spirit day activities for the remainder of the year, and are already thinking about our next big holiday - Christmas!






In Language arts, the students have started a narrative writing unit. We are currently working on what makes up a narrative story, and how to distinguish this from other types of writing.
